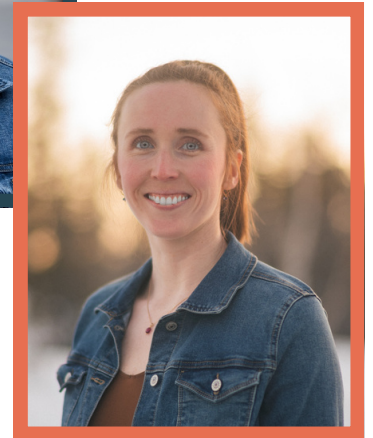

Leadership Message

2024 was a year of change and growth at the Yellowknife Community Foundation. We said goodbye to Sophie Kirby, who served as Executive Director for three years, and welcomed Korry Garvey as her successor. We also launched our first territory-wide fundraising campaign, with a goal of raising \$3 million for the Northern Legacy Fund by 2028. As part of this campaign, we participated in Giving Tuesday, raising over \$17,000. Our lead sponsor, Rio Tinto Diavik, not only matched this amount but contributed even more, greatly increasing the impact of the campaign.

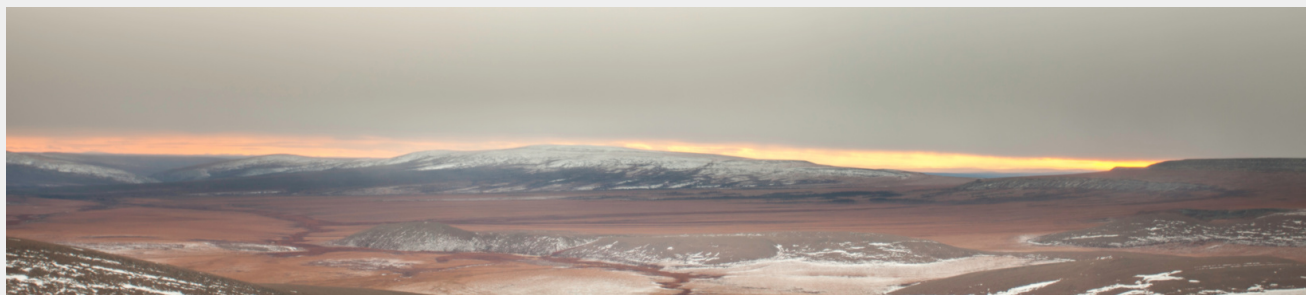
In 2024, we supported 47 Northern students through student awards and provided grants to 32 projects. For the second year in a row, we also delivered post-emergency funding to communities affected by climate emergencies through our Resilient Communities Fund, including Fort Good Hope, West Point First Nation, and Behchokq. And beginning next year, we will be able to give directly to non-profit organizations whether they are registered charities or not, thus easing the way to apply for funding.

Two new funds were established, and the Foundation received over \$500,000 in donations, many made in memory of loved ones, strengthening our ability to serve the community. The Yellowknife Community Foundation is financially healthy, and we will continue to seek out new opportunities to grow both our revenues and our granting, ensuring the

long-term vitality of the organization.

In the spring, our two staff members travelled to Winnipeg to learn and connect with other Community Foundations across Canada. This information sharing has resulted in identifying efficiencies in our operations and keeping abreast of the latest philanthropic practices around governance, equity, reconciliation, and social justice, to name a few.

We are deeply grateful to all our volunteers, supporters, and donors this year, and throughout our 32-year history. Together, we have grown to an asset base of over \$8 million. Whether through a \$1 gift or a \$1 million donation, every contribution has made a difference. We look forward to continuing our work with communities across the Northwest Territories.

An Excerpt from NNSL: DEGREES OF SUCCESS: Norman Wells student shares tips for navigating university in southern cities

Danielle Pike has big plans for her life after university, but admits leaving her hometown of Norman Wells to pursue her education was challenging at first.

"It was extremely difficult, my first year at university," the 23-year-old said. "I didn't do well at all that first year, academically and mentally, just leaving from such a small community."

Pike started her post-secondary education at the University of Alberta (U of A) in Edmonton — a city of over million people, and a big change from the town of about 700 that she grew up in. She immediately struggled to navigate her new environment, finding it difficult to do important tasks like buying groceries, and as her stress mounted, her grades began to slip.

Eventually, her grade point average got low enough that she was forced to withdraw from her program. For some students, that might have been the end of the road, but Pike didn't give up. She soon returned to her studies through U of A's transition year program, which is designed "for Indigenous students who may not be prepared to enter a faculty through the regular admissions route," according to the school's website. Completing that program set Pike up to continue pursuing a degree at the University of British Columbia (UBC) in Vancouver.

"[The transition year program] really did help me to find the resources I needed to support my learning with tutors and writing mentors," she said. "That program did set me up for success for UBC."

Pike is pursuing a bachelor of education at UBC, with the aim of teaching Indigenous students. When she's obtained her degree, she hopes to return to the North to teach for a while, and beyond that, she aims to become a university professor.

Celebrating Indigenous Knowledge Through Art and Land-Based Learning

Dechinta Centre for Research and Learning brought powerful energy to the Yellowknife Visitors Centre with their exhibition and workshop series, Dechinta Means Bush: Collaborations with the Land. Hosted in partnership with the Yellowknife Artist Run Community Centre (YK ARCC), the exhibit featured artwork from Dechinta students and alumni, showcasing the beauty and depth of Indigenous land-based education. Dechinta staff member Kynyn Doughty recalled the pride and joy felt during the exhibit's opening day. As Dene drummers played, the small room came alive and everyone began dancing together in celebration. The moment captured what Dechinta is all about: bringing people together through culture, land-based learning, and Northern Indigenous knowledge in a way that feels joyful, meaningful, and connected.

Qmunity Camp, NWT

Qmunity Camp NWT was established in 2019, and brings together campers from all across the North who identify as 2SLGBTQIPA+ and/or questioning. Programming is rooted in Indigenous ways of knowing and being.



"As a young 2SIQTIP Leader in the North, I often feel very isolated by my broader community. Hosting the first 2SIQTIP Gathering in March of 2024 was the first time I had ever been fully immersed in a space full of folks who identify in a way similar to mine and who feel that pain and sadness in the same way I do. It was liberating and greatly impacted my sense of self and belonging. It's funny how everyone expects me to be this uber-confident Two Spirit boss lady, but I'm just like these kids [who attended the Gathering]. My heart yearns for community in the same ways theirs do. The Northern Birthwork Collective is a group of birthworkers, parents, and community members who come together to support and stand beside pregnant people in the NWT. In 2023/2024, they offered one-on-one doula care, helping people feel truly heard, supported, and less alone in their journeys. They also hosted community sharing circles that grew into something special. They were warm, welcoming spaces where people could open up, share their stories, and feel a sense of belonging. The strong response to these circles showed just how deeply they were needed, and how powerful it can be to come together in community.

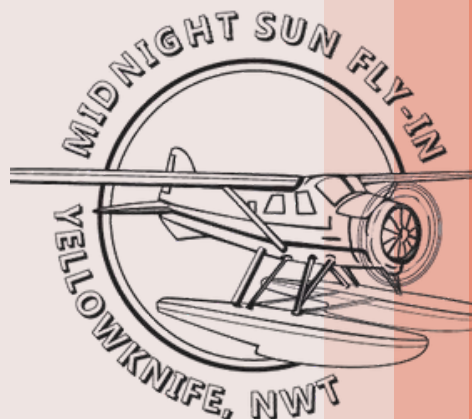

The Midnight Sun Fly-In Association

The Midnight Sun Fly-In Association established the Midnight Sun Aviation Award in 2024 when it closed its doors as an organization. The Fund offers a scholarship to students pursuing education as a pilot or in the aviation field.



"We felt it is important to contribute to the aviation industry, because it is such an important part of our lives in the Northwest Territories. All of the people over the years that have helped with the fly-ins, we all felt that creating a scholarship was a good idea, and the best thing to do with the money we had left as we shut down our organization." Yvonne Quick came up with the idea to start a local Fly-In Association when talking with the Economic Development Officer at the City of Yellowknife in the early 1980s. She convened a group of pilots and started the Midnight Sun Fly-In Association, which invited pilots from all over North America to fly to Yellowknife every two years to gather, share stories, and create friendships.

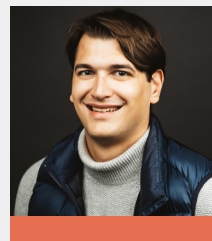

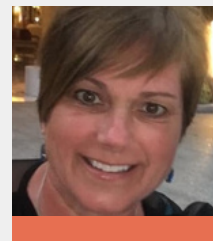

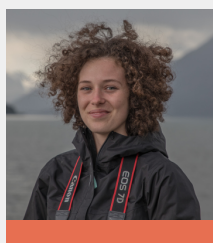

In Memory



We were deeply saddened by the passing of Ian Legaree in early 2025. Ian played an extraordinary role in shaping the Yellowknife Community Foundation over three decades. He was not only a member of our original Board of Directors in 1993, but also part of the City of Yellowknife's early committee that first explored the idea of creating a community foundation. Ian remained on the board of directors for most of the next 30 years with breaks in 2001-2003 and 2013-2014, and he concluded his final term on the board in 2023.

Ian helped transform a small, volunteer-led community foundation with a handful of donors into a thriving organization with thousands of donors that has granted over \$3 million to students and community organizations in Yellowknife and across the Northwest Territories. Ian was present for the Foundation's first grants awarded in 1996, celebrated its milestone of reaching a million-dollar asset base in 2005, and supported the creation of over 30 student awards; achievements he was deeply proud of.

Land Acknowledgement

The Yellowknife Community Foundation's physical office is located in Sòmba K'è on Chief Drygeese Territory in Treaty 8, the traditional home of the Yellowknives Dene and the North Slave Metis, also known as Yellowknife, Northwest Territories.
